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Office Manager Kristin Cook TODAY: CALL AND EMAIL YOUR CONGRESSIONAL REPRESENTATIVES AND SIGN THE PETITION FOR THE REAUTHORIZATION OF THE ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY ACT (ESEA, FORMERLY KNOWN AS NCLB)

Both the House and Senate are in a serious effort to rewrite the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA)/so-called No Child Left Behind last amended in 2002. This means the time for each and every one of us to act and shape the outcome is now. This reauthorization of ESEA is an opportunity to set a new vision of shared responsibility for a public education system that promotes opportunity, equity and excellence for all students — a system where students and teachers can focus on learning over testing. This law will impact every aspect of our classrooms, our students, and our teaching. Your input is needed now.

While the draft bill eliminates the AYP system that led to obsession over testing and in inaccurate labeling and punishment of schools and lifts some of the sanctions, there are still big problems with the draft bill. The draft bill:

- Eliminates the focus on quality of teaching, providing no guidance on terms such as "effectiveness" and the requirement for highly qualified has been eliminated. This undermines teaching as a profession and sets the stage for more programs like Teach for America.
- Repeals current maintenance of effort language allowing states to reduce their own funding for education.
- Allows portablility of Title I funds without guarantees that services are provided. This is, in effect, a voucher.
- Freezes federal funding at Fiscal year 2015 for the next 6 years. This impacts Title I, SPED and other Title funding.
- Increases funding for charter schools without adequate accountability, transparency and equity requirements.
- Instead of focusing on improving schools, it allows an unlimited number of schools to be defined as in need of assistance and allows students to be transported out.
- Still requires annual, federally-mandated standardized testing and assessment driven by accountability based on one test, rather than learning.

Tell Congress a new Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) must mean opportunity for all, and time to learn

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Now is the time for educators to make their voices heard!

As educators, we have a chance to set a new vision for a public education system that promotes opportunity and excellence for ALL students.

In order for Congress to get the law right this time, we need every educator to tell members of Congress to make sure that any new federal education bill does three things:

- Creates more opportunities for all students to receive a quality education, no matter their zip code
- Replace the one-size-fits-all, top-down approach with a new "school dashboard" of indicators
 to identify opportunity gaps and reveal gaps in some of the basic components of a high-quality, well-rounded education that prepares each student for college and/or a career.

2. Allows more time for students to learn and more time for teachers to teach

- Testing takes time away from learning. We must reduce the emphasis on federally-mandated standardized tests that would free up time and resources, diminish "teaching to the test," and allow educators to focus on what is most important: instilling a love of learning in their students.
- A revised ESEA should include a proven approach called "grade-span" testing which would test students in English, Math and Science once in elementary school, once in middle school and once in high school.

3. Ensures every student has a qualified educator who is empowered to lead

- We need to build a pipeline of diverse, fully qualified educators who are available to every student in every zip code, and who are prepared to teach in today's classrooms on day one.
- Educators care about their students. We must ensure they have authority to do their job and lead on behalf of their students.
